(1 Credit) (15 days)

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COURSE DESCRIPTION – In this course you will explore the legal relationship between the government and the citizen, with an emphasis on criminal (public) law.

- Section 1: Rights and Responsibilities 3 days
- Section 2: Protecting Society and Ourselves 3 days

GENERAL OUTCOMES -

- 1. You will explore various sources of protection for group and individual rights and responsibilities.
- 2. You will learn about methods of protecting your rights and responsibilities.
- 3. You will learn how and why children, youth and adults are treated differently with respect to criminal law.
- 4. You will distinguish between civil, quasi-criminal, and criminal law.
- 5. You will create a connection between a personal inventory of your interests, beliefs, resources, and prior learning/experiences and occupational choices relating to legal studies.
